In a year filled with school closures, civil unrest and more on line schooling, the final performance was a wonderful collaborative effort and closed the third term on a high note. Over the course of the last two years our lives have been thrown into turmoil and online schooling has forced our children onto even more screen time than ever. In addition, it exacerbated the stress and trauma for families, students and teachers and communities.

Reflecting on the year provides an opportunity to consider the ways in which school can support the students and one of the important ways to do this is through the Arts programme. The Arts can play a crucial role for students and guides in addressing healing and trauma, it builds self confidence, improves performance and cognition in other subjects such as mathematics and science, enhances visual learning, decision making, manual dexterity, creativity, and develops attention to detail. The students develop social skills, the ability to tackle challenges, and most importantly to complete tasks.

Research shows that exposure to the Arts can help teenagers develop many of the skills that are valued in the professional and academic world, by employers and leaders everywhere. These include collaboration, creative thinking, problem solving, motivation and persistence. In addition, studies demonstrate that involvement in Arts programmes improves confidence and academic performance.

INTERSESSION - MALOLOTJA


Identities and relationships
